ROLE OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT

Executive Summary and Recommendations

Introduction

Among the topics discussed at the Council away day was consideration of the role of the Council Vice-President.

The group which considered this topic recommended that a paper on the role of the Vice-President should be considered at the December 2006 Council meeting.

The Health Professions Order 2001 makes no mention of the election or the role of a Vice-President.

The decision to elect a Vice-President was taken by the Shadow Health Professions Council.

Standing Order 8 states:

The Council may appoint a member to be Vice-President of the Council and the Vice-President shall preside at any meeting of the Council at which the President is absent.

The role of the Vice-President was agreed at the December 2004 Council meeting as part of the members' Code of Conduct. The role is as follows;

In addition to his or her role as a Council member, the Vice-President will:

• deputise for the President when he or she is not available; and in deputising for the President, follow the role description given above (see background information for role of President below).

Council is asked to consider the following options;

- (i) that the role of the Vice-President should remain as agreed by Council in December 2004;
- (ii) that the role of the Vice-President should be amended and that members should email the Secretary to Council with suggestions as to what the amended role should be. The Executive would put a further paper to Council with proposals for an amended role in March 2007;
- (iii) that there is no role for the Vice-President and that deputising for the President could be carried out by any nominated Council member with appropriate expertise in that area.

Decision

The Council is asked to consider the above options and agree a way forward.

Background information

1. The Secretariat contacted 7 regulators regarding the role of their Vice-President. Of the 5 regulators who responded 2 did not have a Vice-President (GMC and GDC, the GDC took the decision to abolish the role) and the other 3 had a similar role to that agreed by Council in December 2004.

2. The role of the Council President

In addition to his or her role as a Council member, the HPC President will also:

- provide strong non-executive leadership, and encourage open and pro-active • accountability to the public and the professions;
- act as an ambassador for the Council, inspiring confidence in the organisation and • representing the interests of statutory regulation to outside bodies;
- develop and maintain constructive collaboration, networking and consultation • with key stakeholders, and others when required;
- uphold public interest in all that the HPC undertakes; •
- chair meetings of Council (see information above on the role of a committee chairman);
- monitor and develop Council members' performance, providing support as necessary; and
- manage the Council's Chief Executive so as to secure effective oversight of the ٠ development and achievement of the Council's strategic, policy and operational objectives and compliance with its statutory responsibilities.

 - monitor the Chief Executive's performance against these objectives
