1 Communications projects and activities

HCPC In Focus: On 26 February 2016 we published a special edition of HCPC In Focus which focused on the revised Standards of conduct, performance and ethics. For the first time the newsletter went to all registrants that had indicated they were happy to receive communications on their registration, as well as our existing distribution list. This increased the newsletter's reach from 24,504 to 243,926.

We are continuing to send the newsletter in this way. Early indications are positive. The special edition achieved an open rate of 42% with the total number of views reaching 255,873 and only 199 unsubscribes. We are continuing to monitor each edition and will include more detailed statistics in future communications reporting.

Intranet to sharepoint: Working with colleagues in IT, requirements for a new sharepoint intranet solution have been gathered and agreed. Shortlisted suppliers were invited to present to the project team and a preferred supplier has now been selected. Further technical and contractual details are currently being addressed before confirming this decision.

2 Communications expertise to departments

Revised Standards of conduct, performance and ethics (SCPE) (Policy): In this period, two key pieces of work.

- We have hosted two tweetchats and published one blog piece. The first tweetchat on 17 February invited participants to ask any questions they had about the revised standards. We received good engagement, with over 15,000 more impressions and an increase of 0.8% engagement rate on Twitter than on a 'regular' day. The second tweetchat on 21 April focused on standard 8: being open and honest when things go wrong. Again, we received good engagement, with over double the number of impressions and an increase of 0.6% engagement rate on Twitter than on a 'regular' day. The blog piece focused on standard 8 and to date (Wednesday 4 May) has been viewed 983 times.
- 237 delegates attended the event to mark the publication of the revised standards on 2 February. They included registrants, education
 providers, employers and representatives from professional bodies. The event was also live streamed and watched by 196 people. Of
 those that completed the post event evaluation 96% answered yes when asked if they felt the event helped them to understand the
 changes. The overall event was rated as excellent or good by 92% of delegates.

Social Media guidance (Policy): We are currently working with Policy and an agency called Clever Together to develop an online workshop to help inform the consultation document. The workshop will open on 10 May and we already have 93 people signed up to contribute. The Media and PR team are promoting the workshop across social media and to professional media.

Consultations (Policy): We promoted the following consultations 'Consultation on renaming the 'local anaesthetics' and 'prescription only medicines' annotations for chiropodists / podiatrists', 'Consultation on draft standards for the use of exemptions by orthoptists to sell, supply and administer medicines', 'Consultation on revised Guidance on conduct and ethics for students' and the 'Consultation on revised standards of proficiency for social workers in England'.

3 Business as usual communications activities

Events

Employer events: On 27 January we held an Employer event in Glasgow and 58 delegates attended. The event included presentations on what employers need to know about the registration and fitness to practise processes and the research on preventing small problems becoming big problems. Future Employer events will focus on the revised SCPE.

Meet the HCPC events: On 4 February we held a Meet the HCPC event in Dalton-in-Furness. The event was attended by 98 delegates and of those that completed the post event evaluation, 100% rated the overall event as excellent or good. On 20 April we held an event in Derby and 106 registrants attended. Of those that completed the post event evaluation, 81% rated the event as excellent or good. Both events included a presentation and workshop on the revised Standards of conduct, performance and ethics.

Exhibitions: On 17 and 18 February we attended The Gathering event in Glasgow. This is the largest UK based exhibition and event for those working in the third sector and it is also visited by the public. We exhibited and ran a seminar on who we are what we do. We engaged with 102 people, responding to queries and raising awareness of our public protection role.

On 8 and 9 March we attended the Health and Wellbeing event in Birmingham which is a leading event for HR and occupational health professionals. We exhibited and engaged with 191 people across the two days.

On 26 to 28 April we attended Naidex in Birmingham. Naidex is the largest disability, rehabilitation and homecare event in the UK. We exhibited and delivered presentations on CPD and the revised Standards of conduct, performance and ethics, engaging with 326 people.

Education seminars: On 25 February in London and 22 March in Edinburgh we ran Education seminars. The objective of the seminars was to inform education providers about our approach to change and advise how they should engage with the process. The London seminar was attended by 61 delegates and the Edinburgh seminar by 24 delegates. Post event evaluations indicated that all delegates would be likely to attend future seminars based on their experience at these seminars.

Webcast for Employers: On 21 April we ran a webcast for employers. It included presentations on what employers need to know about registration, the FTP process and the revised Standards of conduct, performance and ethics for registrants. We included Q&A sessions and an online interactive voting element to increase audience participation. We had 76 viewers live and will promote the on demand version further. Of those that completed the post event evaluation, 44% rated the event as excellent and 56% as good.

Media

Statements and reactive lines: Reactive lines were written for the Kids Company psychologist who was suspended for 12 months and also for a social work student who was removed from their university course. Both situations attracted high volumes of media interest. Following on from the Chief Executive's appearance at the Education Select Committee Social Work Reform Inquiry we have worked with the News Editor at Community Care to amend two articles that appeared on their website.

Articles: We secured articles in Complete Nutrition, Locum Today, Synergy News, Community Care, Frontline, Care Appointments, RAD magazine and Just physio. Content included general updates and a mix of registration renewal, revised SCPE and the policy consultation on the draft revised Standards of proficiency for social workers in England.

Publishing

We have published the following documents.

- The Education annual report 2015
- An updated version of How to raise a concern, our guidance document for members of the public
- The Standards for prescribing which includes an updated foreword and introduction
- An updated version of our Promoting your registration leaflet
- A new FTP factsheet on mediation

We are also working on the following projects: revised Guidance on conduct and ethics for students, a service user guide on our revised Standards of conduct, performance and ethics and updating our public awareness material.

Stakeholder

Parliamentary monitoring and engagement: Preparation for the Chief Executive's oral evidence session with the Education Select Committee was a significant focus of activity during this period (see separate Council paper). Supplementary to this, a number of parliamentary questions have been tabled relating to social work. These have centred on retention in the profession, the cost of transferring statutory regulation from the General Social Care Council to the HCPC in 2012, and the quality of social work education.

Outside of social work, Justin Madders MP asked several questions on the paramedic profession relating to recruitment and retention and changes in qualification requirements to paramedicine courses.

Stakeholder engagement activities: The Stakeholder Communications Manager attended: Health and Wellbeing at Work (Tuesday 8 and Wednesday 9 March) meeting a range of registrants and employers, as well as attending sessions on professionalism and employee engagement and emotional resilience; the Advancing Healthcare Awards on Friday 15 April where he met the four lead AHPs for England, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales; and Naidex where the team presented on the revised Standards of conduct, performance and ethics and our CPD requirements as well as meeting with Skills for Care, the College of Occupational Therapists and RNIB.

Web and digital

Web deployment: A small web deployment went live to update our various websites with the new 0300 number.

Web and digital requests: 177 digital requests, including making relevant changes to the website for the new hearings facility, preparation for guidance on the new EU directive concerning European Mutual Recognition (EMR) and audio recordings for the IT service desk and the Registration phone system.

Apps: We completed testing on updates to the myHCPC app, adding personalisation and improvements to navigation and look and feel.

Internal communications

Employee survey: Working with the Human Resources Department and an external supplier, we have been preparing for the all employee survey. This has included hosting two focus groups with employees to determine key areas for the survey.
